Branded as Summer Library Pursuit, and patterned loosely on the Trivial Pursuit board game, patrons have many ways to participate. 

The Book Discussion Group will meet via Zoom on Wednesday, June 16, at 6:30pm to discuss **The Map of Salt and Stars** by Zeyn Joukhadar. Space is limited, so <u>RSVP</u> if you wish to attend.

About the book: This "beguiling" (Seattle Times) and stunning novel begins in the summer of 2011. Nour has just lost her father to cancer, and her mother moves Nour and her sisters from New York City back

to Syria to be closer to their family. In order to keep her father's spirit alive as she adjusts to her new home, Nour tells herself their favorite story—the tale of Rawiya, a twelfth-century girl who disguised herself as a boy in order to apprentice herself to a famous mapmaker.

But in Syria, change is coming, and it isn't long before the war reaches their quiet neighborhood. When a shell destroys Nour's house and almost takes her life, she and her family are forced to choose: stay and risk more violence or flee across seven countries of the Middle East and North Africa in search of safety—along the very route Rawiya and the mapmaker took eight hundred years before in their quest to chart the world. As Nour's family decides to take the risk, their journey becomes more and more dangerous, until they face a choice that could separate their family forever.

Following alternating timelines and a pair of unforgettable heroines coming of age in perilous times, The Map of Salt and Stars is the "magical and heart-wrenching" (Christian Science Monitor) story of one girl telling herself the legend of another and learning that, if you listen to your own voice, some things can never be lost. 
and social literacies, partnering with local community organizations and connecting people with resources and information.

Saturday, June 12 10am Zoom presentation

We use roads almost every day, and we can benefit by knowing how most Centre County roads came into being over time. Historically, citizens signed petitions to county Court for public and private roads to be established. Road petition documents are a valuable and largely unknown government record that can be helpful for Centre County local history or genealogy research. In the same record

group, you can also find petitions for other purposes, such as changes of township boundaries. Join us for "Centre County Road Petitions in Research" to learn the basics about these historic records and how they can be used to supplement your research.

MOBILE CAREER CENTER TO VISIT CENTRE HALL AND HOLT



- If you could only choose one song to play every time you walked into a room for the
