


Bellefonte and Centre Hall, beginning September 2

VIRTUAL BOOK DISCUSSION GROUPS




The Afternoon and Evening book discussion groups will continue to meet virtually. (Click on the book cover to register.)

Getting to know ROBBIN DEGERATU



- Who's your all-time favorite book character? Being a reader means befriending many characters across different books and universes, so this is a tough question. The character that stays with me the most is Paige Mahoney from Samantha Shannon's The Bone Season series. She's resilient, strategic, and loyal – and it's a joy to read her story.
- What language would you like to learn one day? Why? I would really like to learn Mandarin Chinese or Arabic one day (or maybe both!). I took French and Italian in school, and have learned a little bit of Romanian from family, but I think that Mandarin or Arabic would be so useful in everyday life and in travel, and they're different than the other languages I'm familiar with.
- If a benefactor gave you \$75,000 to launch a business, what kind of business would you start? It would be a lot of hard work, but I would love to start a business selling homemade breads, cakes, hot sauces, condiments, and other consumables out of a small storefront in Bellefonte.
- If you could time travel, when and where would you go? July 20, 1969: I would love to watch the moon landing with either of my parents – who were children at the time – and my grandparents. We take it for granted now, but I would love to experience that moment with them, and feel the sense of wonder and inspiration that captivated the world.
- Have you found anything scandalous or anyone famous in your family tree? I haven't discovered anything particularly salacious or groundbreaking, but I have learned how hard it can be to track your ancestry in some parts of the United States! Both sides of my family have roots in Appalachia, and I've had a really hard time tracing my ancestors who lived near the Tennessee/Virginia border in the early 1900s. It makes me really appreciate all of the genealogical research that people did before the advent of the Internet and DNA tests!
- What's your favorite family tradition? My husband and I have created a tradition of traveling somewhere new to us for our anniversary each year. It's a fun way to celebrate, and to spend the day doing our favorite thing: exploring somewhere unfamiliar and learning as we go.
- If you could back and meet your ancestors or go in the future to meet your descendants, which would you rather do? My descendants, absolutely. I would love to meet them and hear about their lives, what they are proud of, and what they think of the world that they live in.
